Tick Carrying New Disease Found in the Southeast - The Lonestar Tick

A new tick-borne virus has been discovered in the Southeast - the Heartland virus. More info regarding this virus can be found at https://tinyurl.com/3w84jr33. This disease is carried by the Lonestar tick, which is described in the above article. The lone star tick, which has a telltale white dot on its back, is so tiny it can go unnoticed on the skin. and you might not even know if you are bitten. One person in Georgia is known to have died as a result of an infection from this tick. The disease has been detected in the deer population in Georgia. One study of Georgia Lonestar ticks found the disease in one in 2000 ticks. Heartland virus can cause fever, fatigue, decreased appetite, headache, nausea, diarrhea, and muscle or joint pain. The virus can also affect blood counts and liver function.

Expect Delays at Dallas Hwy and Whitlock Ave

Crews will start clearing work for the Whitlock Avenue trail segment of the Kennesaw Mountain Pedestrian Improvements on Monday, Oct. 25. Significant delays are expected along Dallas Highway/Whitlock Avenue between John Ward Road and Cheatham Hill Drive. Crews will be working in the area from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on weekdays, and road capacity will be reduced to one lane.

Traffic delays are expected to be worse in the afternoon in the westbound direction. Alternate routes are recommended.

2021/2022 Fund Raising

Your volunteer hours help greatly for the many projects we do in the park and we greatly appreciate you contributing your "sweat equity" alongside our 80+ staff volunteers who routinely support each event. We are a non-profit all volunteer organization. However, like any business, we do have bills to pay.

Many of our projects are funded by the park or through grants we apply for. These funds are typically targeted for specific projects and do cover the big expenses such as rocks, stone dust, dirt, wood beams, bridges, fences, and such. But, after all the big stuff is paid for, we still have need to cover our day-to-day operating expenses for things like saw blade sharpening, fuel, tool repairs, equipment maintenance, work gloves, bug spray, drinking water, snacks, and porta-potties, along with basic business expenses - e.g. insurance. For these expenses, we rely on your donations.

Each year we kick off a new round of fund raising and this is the 2021/2022 big "ask." We need your help with this, even small donations help. We will conclude this drive at the end of FY 2022 (September, 2022).

As we approach our 19th year in operation, we ask you to please think '20', like \$20.. \$40.. \$60..... \$200... \$2000. All donations to the Trail Club support our work at the park, and are tax deductible.

Upcoming Work Day Schedule:

We are back in the business of trail maintenance! See the sign-up links, above. We are still limiting our numbers, but anyone one is now welcome to sign-up.

The Trail Club will provide supervision and tools. Volunteers should wear work clothes and closed toed shoes. Participants are encouraged to bring their own water, work gloves and masks. The NPS Volunteer Service Agreement and COVID forms are required, signed by a parent or guardian, if the student is under 18 years old. The forms are available on the trail club web site: http://www.kennesawmountaintrailclub.org/volunteer.php

Parking and registration will be in the field near the Visitor's Center. Vehicle Entrance Passes will issued at registration.

If your school, church, business, or community organization would like to schedule a special work day as a team building or public service activity once we

resume our work day schedules, e-mail us at trails@kennesawmountaintrailclub.org at least 4 weeks in advance. Trail work can be performed any day of the week.

We work closely with the Park Service and assist the park staff by providing critically needed volunteer effort to install signs, build bridges, and maintain the 20+ miles of trails. Since our beginning in 2002, the Trail Club has donated over 281,000 volunteer hours to Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park.

We hope to see you at a work day as soon as we return to our normal work days.

Just A Reminder...

When the newsman says this may turn into a full fledged "situation," that's probably not good. It could take a long time for something to become a situation; or it could just pop up, physically or in your mind.

I've always been interested in cartoons and comic strips. Of course some of the stuff I like is 'Old time' and things most readers forgot or maybe younger readers never knew- but, makes for a good story. With my evening job, while in high school, the man who I relieved, whom I now think of as a mentor, had been in the Civilian Conservation Corps and edited the CCC's newspaper, he even drew cartoons depicting the fun side of hard work. I also had a Sunday School teacher who for many years was the editorial cartoonist for the Atlanta Newspapers, "Baldy." You wouldn't have a clue what these fellows did and as with most newspaper "people" you wouldn't recognise them.


Point being is, there are lots of ways to get a message delivered. Fun fact - when growing up we had a neighbor who did drawing for the "Mark Trail" comic strip - maybe that's why I like the outdoors.

Recently there was an unexploded Parrott Rifle shell found at Kennesaw Mountain. It was a 10 pounder (size went up to 300 lbs.) which was shot from what one now would simply say was a cannon (look it up for detail). That artillery was used by the Northern Forces in battles at the Park where some 4000+ soldiers perished. That war was a long time ago, but the harm still remains.

Whoever thought that cartoons gave some predictions of the future; here comes more old stuff so keep reading. Remember "Dick Tracy's" smart watch, and that "Superman" could fly faster than a speeding bullet; bet those Parrott shells didn't move that fast. But, now there are ballistic missiles that travel @10 times faster than the speed of sound and communication is everywhere.

Hearing and reading about the hazardous shell that was found at the Park caused me to remember the cartoon strip "Pogo" (I bet you'll look that one up), cartoonist Walt Kelly wrote, "We have met the enemy and it is us." In actuality he modified that line from what American Naval Officer Oliver Hazard Perry said when capturing Royal Navy Ships during the

1813 Battle of Lake Erie. The Pogo cartoon referenced trash/discards in observance of Earthday, April 22, 1970. Even recently, I had a Letter to Editor published where I



complained about the B.C. Comic Strip portraying a remote control Duck having a recorded message - "Really" I wrote, that didn't occur in BC times. Oh, how soon we forget our own thoughts - we now have drones that do that!

It was a stark reminder when that "live" shell was found that there was a war on the beautiful grounds of the Park. And sad to say it was fighting as is happening now, could be a "Pogo" interpretation - they look like us. Conflicts of even long ago have remnants remaining. Pogo saw so much trash and discards. Even with our old house, I've been told that the plumbing was sealed with lead from miniballs gathered at Kennesaw Mtn. before it was a National Battlefield Park. Sure things can turn around and be used for good. Just like a comic may be in jest it is still thought provoking.

We get reminders of what used to be, what could be and what is happening now. A cartoon can depict hard work and politics. And sometimes a thing from the past may pop up as a warning. Don't work off the Trail: the WHY is the unexploded shell! Stay on the Trail, be careful where you step, practice safety, stay well and take advice from this old worker, "Pray for Peace."

Civil War Parrot Shell Found at Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield

A National Park Service sponsored archeologist survey team discovered a Civil War Parrot Shell during the evaluation of a prospective trail reroute in early March, 2022. Various stories regarding the discovery can be found at:

Based on current information, the shell was determined to be live and potentially dangerous.

We have always reminded visitors at the Park to stay on the trails - do not bushwack or otherwise hike off-trail. If you see any unusual item in the park while on the trail, leave it alone, note the location and report it immediately either via 911 or to the Park staff at the Visitor Center.

Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park Interpretive Programs for April

*All programs are outdoors and weather dependent.

April 2, 11 am: Assault Trail Hike

"And how can a man die better, than by facing fearful odds- for the ashes of your fathers and the temples of your gods?" This Ranger- led guided hike will put you in the footsteps of the Union soldiers, re- tracing their charge against the Confederate trenches at Cheatham Hill. The hike begins at the Activity Area 3 parking lot (GPS Coordinates: 33.933020, -84.604780)

April 3, 11 am: All About Artillery

"Artillery adds dignity to what would otherwise be an ugly brawl"- Frederick the Great. Have you ever wondered exactly how those cannons you see around the park work? Come out for this 30-minute talk all about Civil War artillery and even get a hands- on experience. This talk will meet at the Visitor Center.

April 5th and 7th, 10 am - 11 am: Spring Break Story Time

Spring has sprung! Kennesaw Mountain and Cobb County Public Library will be presenting special programming on April 5th and April 7th at the Battlefield. Programs include short ranger and librarian talks on solider living, history, and wildlife resources. We will finish each program with a short hike.

April 9, 11 am: Kennesaw Mountain Hike

"The scenery from the top of the Mountain is really grand and will repay in some measure for being shot at so much"- William Wallace McMillan, 17th Alabama. Join us for a Ranger- guided hike to the summit of Big Kennesaw Mountain. We will explore the history of the area from pre- history to today. The climb is moderately- difficult, so wear sturdy shoes and bring plenty of water.

April 10th, 10 am, 11 am, 1 pm and 2 pm: Infantry Demonstrations

Come on out and see our living history volunteers and Rangers set up camp right next to the Visitor Center and live life for a day as Civil War infantryman. Rifle firings will occur at the above-specified times. We will also go over basic drill, school of the soldier, arms and accourrements and even food and disease.

April 16, 11 am: Earthworks of the Civil War

When you think of trench warfare, you probably imagine a desolate World War 1 battlefield like the Somme, but did you know that trench warfare was perfected 50 years before during the American Civil War? Meet the Ranger at the Dead Angle of Cheatham Hill to discover the important role these defenses held during the latter half of the Civil War.

April 17, 10 am and 2 pm: Civil War Museum Tour

It's more than just the artifacts! Join us for two special tours of our Visitor Center museum where our Rangers take you on a journey through the entirety of the Civil War (with heavy focus on the Western Theater and the Battle of Kennesaw Mountain). We'll discuss the causes, biggest battles, blunders and how the war still affects us today over 150 years later.

April 23, 10 am- 11:30 am: Junior Ranger Day

To wrap up National Park Week, Kennesaw Mountain proudly presents Jr. Ranger Day 2022! This year, we invite all Jr. Rangers to come out for an interactive scavenger hunt! After you get your clues from the ranger, you will search around and in the Visitor Center and learn all about what makes Kennesaw Mountain a special place! Program starts at Visitor Center.

April 24, 11 am: Pigeon Hill History Hike

"Presently, and as if by magic, there sprung from the earth a host of men, and in one long, waving line of blue the infantry advanced."- General Samuel French. Some of the toughest fighting of the war occurred on a small spur just below the dual- peaks of Kennesaw. This Ranger- led hike will describe the futile Union assault and the Confederate defense of Pigeon Hill. We will meet at the Pigeon Hill parking area (GPS Coordinates: 33.963276, -84.594391) and will go up the rocky slope. The hike is moderate, so bring good shoes and plenty of water.

April 30, 11 am- 3 pm: Evolution of Civil War- Era Firearms

Join park volunteer and historian Fred Hybart as he showcases his wonderful collection of Civil War era firearms. Fred's collection will show the incredible evolution of weapons technology through the course of the Civil War. Fred will give a few short talks, and his collection will be viewable throughout the day as well.


