
Acting Park Superintendent

Upcoming Work Day Schedule:

Our trail work days are open to the public on the 2nd Saturday of each month and are a wonderful way to get outside & enjoy nature while helping preserve the national park for future visitors. Registration will open at 8:00 am at the new parking lot, .2 miles north of the Visitor Center on Old 41 and usually are finished by 12:00 p.m. It takes approximately 5 minutes to walk to the picnic area near the Visitor Center - please arrive there by 8:30 am. Activities usually include the use of shovels, rakes, picks, and other tools to fix erosion problems on the 20+ mile trail system. Please do not wear open-toed shoes. Long pants are recommended.

As winter months approach, weather conditions can change quickly. We value our volunteers' health, comfort and safety so to promote safer work conditions, we'll cancel work days if the temperature is below 40 degrees and/or there's a high probability of precipitation. If we must cancel a workday,


we'll post an announcement on the front page of the KMTC website at: www.kennesawmountaintrailclub.org

A book review by Jay Haney

When Hiram Ulysses Grant was born 27 April 1822, the United States was an embryonic republic with a population of under 10 million, less than Annam at the time. It had an agricultural economy that relied on slave labor in its southern states. The Monroe Doctrine had not been declared and North Georgia was Indian land. The vast Louisiana purchase was yet to be settled, much less explored. There were no railroads or telegraph lines.

By his death on 23 July 1885, the USA was a burgeoning industrial power with a population of well over 50 million, 10 million more than France. The western Indian Wars were coming to a close. The country spanned the continent, linked into one nation by railroads and telegraph.

Grant lived in interesting times. Here is his story, his impact on arguably the most turbulent times in our national history. Hero of the War with Mexico, business failure, four star general, President, world traveler, Ponzi scam target, cancer victim who saved his families' fortune by writing his memoirs.

Written by Ron Chernow, perhaps the leading biographer of our day. Noted for his engaging prose and superb research, he gives a portrait of the General that clears the dead wood of our preconceptions and truly is a reconstruction of Grant's place in history.





Ranked #16 in the 100 Greatest American Currency Notes, the large-size Series 1899 "Black Eagle" \$1 Silver Certificate is among the best-known and most sought-after U.S. currency notes. Named for its famous vignette engraving, Eagle of the Capitol, and featuring impressive portraits of Abraham Lincoln and Ulysses S. Grant, this final 19th-century \$1 motif signaled the end of intricately designed U.S. currency notes. The Series 1899 Black Eagle note is also from an era when paper money was backed by precious silver, as the issue bears the statement one silver dollar payable to the bearer on demand. **All park programming is free and open to the public. No registration required unless noted. Programs start at Visitor Center except when otherwise specified.

February 8 @ 11:00 am - 11:30 am 'Shaping Lincoln: Abraham Lincoln Before his Presidency'

In recognition of Abraham Lincoln's 210th Birthday, this 30 minute ranger-led program discusses Abraham Lincoln prior to his presidency and what shaped the 16th President of the United States of America.

February 8 @ 8:00 am - 12:30 pm 'Kennesaw Mountain Trail Club Work Day'

Volunteers are needed for each work day to help park staff maintain the 20-plus trails of Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park. Parking and registration is at the Overflow Parking Lot on Old Highway 41.

The NPS Volunteer Services Agreement is required. A parent must sign the form if the child is under 18 years old.

February 9 @ 2:30 pm - 3:00 pm 'Memorial Field Walk'

Join us for a short, ranger-led history walk in our Memorial Field in front of the Visitor Center. This program will consist of an in-depth look at the Battle of Kennesaw Mountain and the diversionary attack that occurred.

Please prepare accordingly, as this is an outdoor program. Program will be weather dependent.

February 15 @ 11:00 am - 1 pm 'Guided Mountaintop Hike'

Join us for a ranger-led hike to the top of Big Kennesaw Mountain. The hike will focus on local and Civil War history, as well some of the ecology of the area. This is an outdoor program, so please prepare accordingly.

Length of the hike will be approximately 2 miles, and will be weather dependent.

February 16 @ 2:30 pm - 3:00 pm 'Life of a Soldier'

Life for the common infantry soldier during the Atlanta Campaign was less than ideal. The sacrifice made by those men pave the way for the nation that we live in today. Come out and enjoy an interactive ranger presentation that will honor their sacrifice, as well as illustrate how soldiers lived and fought on the campaign trail in 1864.

February 22 @ 11:00 am – 11:30 pm 'Kennesaw Mountain Artillery Talk'

Come out and enjoy a ranger-led program on the variety of cannons used during the Battle of Kennesaw Mountain. This 30 minute program will compare and contrast the change in artillery technology which was used throughout the Civil War.

February 23 2:30 pm - 4 pm 'Guided Environmental Trail Hike'

Come out and enjoy a guided hike on one of our least traveled, but most informative trails. On this 1.3 mile gentle walk, you will see great examples of the varied geography of Kennesaw Mountain, the feint attack at the base of Big Kennesaw Mountain, and much more.


February 29 @ 2:30 pm - 3:30 pm 'Guided Assault Trail Hike'
Follow in the footsteps of the Union and Confederate soldiers who fought here in that summer of 1864 with this guided hike. A ranger will take you along the Assault Trail, detailing the events of the Battle of Kennesaw Mountain and Cheatham Hill.

The approximate length of this hike is 1 mile and will be weather dependent.
