Recommendations For Trail Users On Observing Physical Distancing Minimums

There are a number of specific recommendations for advising the public to keep safe physical distancing when in parks or on trails:

- Follow CDC's guidance on personal hygiene prior to heading to trails — wash hands, carry hand sanitizer, do not use trails if you have symptoms, cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing, etc.
- Observe at all times CDC's minimum recommended physical distancing of six feet from other people.
 Practice it and know what it looks like. Keep it as you walk, bike or hike.
- Warn other trail users of your presence and as you pass to allow proper distance and step off trails to allow others to pass, keeping minimum recommended distances at all times. Signal your presence with your voice, bell or horn
- Note that trail and park users may find public restrooms closed — be prepared before you leave and time outings so that you are not dependent on public restrooms.
- Bring water or drinks public drinking fountains may be disabled and should not be used, even if operable.
- Bring a suitable trash bag. Leave no trash, take everything out to protect park workers

There is no question that this is a fluid and evolving situation. The experiences of other countries have shown that more stringent measures may be employed by the government to restrict the use of public spaces and private facilities. This guidance is current today, but park and recreation professionals and agency directors should monitor CDC guidance and local, state and federal updates daily.

Irrigation of Farm Land at the Base of Kennesaw Mountain

Kennesaw Mountain is basically a huge rock outcropping covered by mineral soil and topped with organic soil. Both soil layers are deep enough to sustain and support roots of large trees. When it rains significantly, the water passes through the layers of soil and reaches the rock outcrop surface. The water drains down the rock outcrop surface accumulating additional water as it flows to the base of the mountain where under the increased hydrostatic pressure it breaks the ground surface as springs. This spring water was channeled into irrigation ditches which supplied water to farm crops and orchards. Evidence of these ditches can be seen as a channel along a portion of the Park's Environmental Trail near the Visitor Center. Moss-covered stones dam the water along the channel and are visible to the keen-eyed hiker. These dams captured the water and allowed diversion of the water to rows of farm crops. While walking the Environmental Trail counterclock-wise, the channel and associated dams are located about 60 yards after the cut off to the 24-Gun Trail.

On the 24-Gun Trail near the center set of rock steps and the bridged creek crossing is a moss-covered stone dam. The dam is about 50 feet across and about 3 feet high at the center. This dam captured water to form a pond which was used for agricultural crop irrigation.

None of the rocks used to control erosion on the Park's trails were taken from any military earth work or any agricultural structure in the Park. The rock used for crib walls and steps used to reduce the effect of erosion were bought from local rock sources outside the Park. The reason for using bought rock used for crib walls and steps was not to disturb or change the existing rock on military earth works and agricultural structures on the surrounding ground of the Park.



Kennesaw Mountain again topped the charts in 2019 as the most-visited Civil War Battlefield Park in the country! In 2014, Kennesaw Mountain NB Park had 2,360,256 visitors and in 2019 we had 2,621,050 visitors far surpassing:



Kennesaw Mountain NBP: An Overview of the last 6 months

Over the last few months, we have seen great change within our park, community, as well as our country. In the last six months there has been so many changes that sometimes it is hard to keep track. At the end of December 2019, Nancy Walther, the park's former superintendent, decided it was time for her to step down and retire. Nancy had a long and distinguished career working for the Park Service. She began at Chesapeake & Ohio Canal National Historical Park in Maryland. This is where she not only began her career but also where she first began to work very closely with volunteers. That dedication to the volunteers and volunteer programs continued throughout her career including her eight years as Superintendent at Kennesaw Mountain. Even though it was sad to see Nancy retire, we wished her the best not only in the new year, but also on her new journey.

As we entered 2020, Anthony Winegar became our acting Superintendent. Anthony, of course, has been a longtime employee at Kennesaw Mountain, first as a Law Enforcement Ranger and now as the park's Chief Ranger. He quickly stepped into Nancy's shoes and began to lead the park into the new year. As we entered our sixth week of the fee program, staff was getting into the full swing of fee collection as well as preparations for the upcoming year. Preparations were underway for school field trips, Junior Ranger Day, Living History events and Battle Anniversary, Park Day, and so much more. There were several new faces to the Kennesaw Mountain team. Earl and Steven joined the team in the fall of 2019. Sadly, Steven had to leave but still stops by to visit. We welcomed Steve from Gulf Islands for a brief period, while he stepped in for a month when Steven had to step down. We also welcomed Sheila and Aaron, who as part of a grant have joined us for a year to help with school field trips and children's programs. In February, Ladrick joined the maintenance team filling the position that was vacated by Adam. In March, Jake and myself attended the NPS History Weapons safety course in Alabama. I, already the park's historic weapons safety supervisor, became an instructor for the course, and Jake became certified as one of the park's additional historic weapons safety supervisors. As usual, every division was in full swing for the upcoming season and were preparing for busy schedules ahead. Then everything changed and everyone was affected by a global pandemic.

On March 17, 2020, the park's visitor center was closed to the general public. A week later, on March 24, Anthony and the management team, with direction from the NPS Region 2 regional office, decided to close the park completely (buildings, parking lots, trails, etc.) for the overall safety of the park's visitors, volunteers, and staff. Only a day later did Cobb County declare a State of Emergency and issued a "shelter in place" order. Staff began working from home with the rest of the country, while law enforcement and

maintenance began working a very specific schedule that would also ensure their safety. As part of the changes, the Interpretive team began offering services via Facebook (ie. genealogical request, virtual Jr. Ranger swear ins, videos, etc.) Sadly, during this time, volunteer activities were cancelled with only a very few working on projects from home. In addition, difficult decisions were made to cancel long standing programs to ensure the safety of all. However, this did not prevent the staff from continuing to remain devoted to the American public.

Throughout the last two months, the management team and park staff has worked diligently to ensure a safe return for visitors, volunteers, and staff alike once the park reopens. During the closure, staff has worked on a variety of projects. Mike has repainted the exterior of the visitor center. The Interpretation staff has produced a variety of videos for Facebook and has even been able to prepare a children's virtual summer camp (June 1 – 5 – Please tell your friends!), a variety of handbooks and trainings have been revised and/or developed, and so much more. Of course, one of the biggest and hardest decisions to make was the cancellation of the 156th Battle of Kennesaw Mountain Anniversary event. However, this doesn't mean that we will completely forget about the anniversary. On June 27 – 28, we will host a variety of Facebook events throughout the day. The anniversary will have videos about artillery and infantry, Facebook Live programs, recorded guided hikes, and children's activities. Please keep posted and share the information with family and friends. Although it will not be the same as a traditional event, we hope that folks enjoy the programs while they remain safe.

On May 10, 2020, we welcomed the park's new acting Superintendent, Lindsey Phillips. She has already jumped right in with her duties and is meeting with employees. As mentioned in last month's newsletter, Lindsey joins Kennesaw Mountain from Gulf Islands National Seashore. She has worked at a variety of parks and we look forward to having her lead the Kennesaw Mountain team over the next four months. At the same time that Lindsey joined us, the park re-opened its trails and most of its parking lots. This of course is part of a three phrase re-opening process. With this stage of re-opening, Law Enforcement and Maintenance staff were able to return to their normal work schedules. The rest of the staff remains working from home until otherwise instructed.

We all look forward to returning to the park. Although there is no specific date for a full re-opening, please remember to take precautions regarding your and your families' safety. I know that we all are looking forward to getting back to the park, but I must remind you to not come to the park as volunteers at this time. Not only is it based on a very specific re-opening plan, but it is primarily for your overall safety. <u>Citizen-General: Jacob Dolson Cox and the Civil War</u> <u>Era</u> by Eugene D. Schmiel, Ohio University Press, 2014


General Cox was a true renaissance man of the gilded age. He was also a key, but little known figure in the battle of Kennesaw Mountain and the Atlanta Campaign of 1864. It was his division that turned Johnston's left flank and forced his abandonment of "the last mountain" as well as the first division to cross the Chattahoochee River at Sope Creek.


