## May Work Day Schedule

Our May 9, 2015 Trail Day Check In will be in the Parking Lot on Burnt Hickory Road at the intersection with Old Mountain Road. We'll have parking available on the grass field for volunteers and check in should be finished by 8:30 AM.

Work planned is to access and clean out a culvert on the Brumby Trail about 70 yards from Burnt Hickory Road. Along this section the trail edge needs to be channeled to direct water into the culvert. We'll also be forming rolling grades and removing trail edge berm to aid water drainage.

Some crews will be assigned to move rocks up the Pigeon Hill Trail from Burnt Hickory Rd. We'll be installing the rock

## April Trail Day 2015, “Spring Break Plan”

Our April Trail Day took place during Spring Break time for schools in this area. I recently had my own spring break (in Fla. where it is historically cold when I go – but not this year!). Our trail day sign-up was a little down due to Spring Break, but still we had a good turnout of about 80 volunteers including Crew Leaders. Thinking of the warm weather expected during spring break, I decided to use a ‘warmed over’ work plan. We had a plan for some 360 university students to travel here for a work project during their break. However, rain that day caused the trip to be canceled. Too bad for them, but good for us as the material had already been placed and with 80 people we could get it done. The original plan included rotations for work, history review, park info and shopping - all these in a span of some 3 hours. So it wasn’t a lot of work, but we could have pulled it off by rotating crews. Because of the bad weather we may never know, but I’d rather be positive than negative.

Our trail work day was successful doing the warmed over plan. We had crews adding sifted dirt to cover hazards on the Visitor Center Trail to Brumby Connect Trail. There were crews at each end of that trail working toward the middle and that worked well. This work will make the trail safe for visitors and it will be self sustaining for years to come. Another group headed out on at least a 2.5 mile hike to their work area. There they added channeling to both sides of the trail to draw spring and rain water off the trail and into existing culverts (as this was the original design). This work should aid in preventing the trail from being perpetually muddy, which causes visitors to go off trail. Also, there were a good number of volunteers who took Danny’s lead and trimmed away invasive Chinese Privet from the Visitor Center Trail and then rode the park bus to Mtn top lot and pulled invasive Garlic Mustard plants from that area. Thanks for all the bags you filled and brought down off the mountain.

And that was pretty much the work plan for about 360 which we did with 80. It was gratifying to see the work completed and we sure had a beautiful day to work. For all of you who came, we really Thank You.

To y’all reading this who were somewhere else for your break, we just hope you had a much fun as we did.

to form diversions to redirect water to keep it from flowing down the trail which causes sever gouging and creates difficult hiking areas. The trail sides need to have berms removed and material brought back onto the trail. This will be a difficult job but with several crews we should be able to make significant improvement to this heavily used trail.

There are several locations in this area that need invasive plant removal and/or other trimming and pruning. This is a good time of year for this type work.

On May 9th, we will meet at 8:30 am at the Parking Lot at Old Mountain Rd. and Burnt Hickory and usually are finished by 1:00 p.m. Activities usually include the use of shovels, rakes, picks, and other tools to fix erosion problems on the 22+ mile trail system. Please do not wear open-toed shoes & long pants are recommended.

We work closely with the Park Service and assist the park staff by providing critically needed volunteer effort to install signs, build bridges, and maintain the 20+ miles of trails. Since our beginning in 2002, the Trail Club has donated over 45,000 volunteer hours to Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park.

## Trail Ambassadors

The Trail Ambassador (TA) program began in 2007 and expands the type of volunteer activities available to the public. Instead of doing typical “trail work” the club has always done with dirt and shovels, our TAs provide a valuable service to the park through volunteer-based guide services, park interpretive information, and trail patrol functions.



Kennesaw Mountain is the most-visited Civil War battlefield park in the country with over **2,000,000 visitors each year!** The park staff does not have the man-power to maintain 20+ miles of trails nor assist all the park visitors. Park staff welcomes the assistance of Trail Club volunteers as TAs.

After completing the training course, TAs work in coordination with the park ranger staff and notify them of emergencies and regulatory or resource violations on the trail system. Volunteers are trained by the National Park Service Staff to handle trail violators with appropriate dialog to avoid unpleasant confrontations.

Trail Ambassadors strive to educate park users to respect and enjoy the historical aspects of the park while obeying trail regulations. Some of our major challenges are:

- Dogs off leash
- Cars failing to stop for pedestrians at cross walks
- Equestrians and hikers going off the designated trails

Here are few examples of typical recurring Trail Ambassador “patrols”:

- A foot patrol is hiking any trail in the park while in uniform and carrying maps and a small first aid kit. TAs answer questions, treat minor injuries, educate and provide a comforting presence for park visitors.
- Support of Civil War artillery or infantry demonstrations. TAs greet visitors and direct them to the demonstration area. A patrol involves covering two or more of the demonstrations for a day. Generally the best position is by the cannon outside the VC entrance 20 minutes before the demo begins. TAs can make a real difference here increasing the audience from 20 to 120 or more!
- Support of monthly Trail Club work days. TAs register volunteers, provide safety patrols to let visitors navigate around work sites, deliver water and snacks and assist Trail Club Crew Leaders supervising the volunteer as needed.

# Work Day Advantage - A Day with Family



# Run up to the Civil War

1859

- Oct 16 Abolitionist John Brown raids Harpers Ferry, Virginia (now West Virginia) hoping to spark a slave resolve
- Oct 18 U.S. Marines under the command of COL Robert E. Lee storm the engine house at Harpers Ferry VA (now WV) and capture John Brown



1860

- Nov 6 Abraham Lincoln elected 16th President of the United States
- Nov 10 Both South Carolina Senators resign seats in the U.S. Senate
- Nov 18 Georgia legislature votes \$1,000,000 to arm the state
- Dec 20 South Carolina secedes from the Union
- Dec 26 Union Maj. Robert Anderson evacuates Ft. Moultrie for Ft. Sumter in Charleston Harbor

# Sultana Disaster

## 27 April 1865


An explosion on a Mississippi River steamboat kills an estimated 1,547 people, mostly Union soldiers returning home after the Civil War. Although this disaster near Memphis took a huge toll, it was barely noticed against the backdrop of the end of the Civil War, a conflict in which tens of thousands had died.

The previous day had marked the final surrender and end of armed resistance by the remaining Confederate forces. Only two weeks earlier, President Abraham Lincoln had been assassinated. Prisoners of war who had been held in hellish conditions in Alabama's Andersonville and Cahaba prison camps were trying to make their way home to Illinois. The steamboat *Sultana* was one of their only options.

At 2 a.m. on April 26, the steamboat left Vicksburg, Mississippi. It was built to hold 376 passengers, but reports say that there were as many as 2,700 people on board as it lumbered slowly up the Mississippi River. It took 17 hours to make the journey to Memphis, where it stopped to pick up more coal.

A couple of hours past midnight, the trip came to a sudden end: near the Arkansas side of the river, one of the *Sultana's* three boilers suddenly exploded. Hot metal debris ripped through the vessel and two other boilers exploded within minutes of the first. The passengers were killed by flying metal, scalding water, collapsing decks and the roaring fire that broke out on board. Some drowned as they were thrown into the water, but rescue boats were immediately dispatched, saving hundreds of lives.

The final tally of casualties was hotly disputed. Some believe it may have been almost 2,000 people, though the U.S. Army said that only 1,200 people had been killed. Local customs officials determined that 1,547 were killed; that became the generally accepted count. The *Sultana* disaster remains one the most deadly maritime accidents in U.S. history.



## Artillery Demonstrations at Kennesaw Mountain

Artillery (cannon) demonstrations show visitors the steps taken to fire cannons during the American Civil War. Each program lasts approximately 30-40 minutes and includes an explanation of the role of artillery during the Atlanta Campaign and at the Battle of Kennesaw Mountain. Artillerists explain the steps of firing a cannon, explaining the role of each person working the cannon. Afterwards, the process is performed in real time and the cannon is fired. The program is free and open to the public. Visitors are encouraged to maintain close control of their pets during firing, as it can be loud, and please prepare small children for the sudden burst of sound.

**All demonstrations take place in the front field with the following exceptions:**




