Trail Work Report - February Through April, 2016

February 13 – Teams were assembled & sent out from the Burnt Hickory Parking Lot. Doug's team went to the Cheatham Hill Horse Parking Lot to work on the new ramp and access trail. The Invasive Plant Crew cleared very large amounts of privet along the Burnt Hickory field.

Work continued from the switchback on Little Kennesaw Mtn down to the trail cutoff. Types of work performed included drainage repair, rock work, and debarment. The Little Kennesaw Cutoff Trail was repaired so the NPS ATV's can now access all the way to the rail fence on Little Kennesaw

In the woods, the weather was wonderful—but the Trail Ambassadors in the parking lot endured very cold (33 F) and windy conditions.

MARCH 12 – Work continued in the same areas as February, with large amounts of privet being chipped since the wood chipper was back in operation.

We learn something every trail day – this time it was how to repair the track on the new ditch witch.

APRIL 2 & 9 – Two “Spring Cleanup” days were held in April around the Visitor Center. This also helped prepare the park for the visit by the National Parks Director, Jon Jarvis on April 16.

Civil War Trust Park Day – April 2 – targeted the picnic area with cleanup and BBQ pit repair, the creek was cleaned extensively, all debris was chipped, the Environmental Trail and 24-Gun trail to Old Mtn Rd were pruned for overhanging branches.

Trail Work Day – April 9 – Cleanup and landscape improvements all around the Visitor Center. Types of work included bed cleanup and mulching (300 bags of mulch), drainage area rocking in, border rocks reset, the concrete drainage ditch behind the Visitor Center was completely cleaned of mud & debris.

APRIL 16th – The Trail Club also had heavy participation in the Junior Ranger Day. During it, National Parks Director Jon Jarvis visited the park.

As our park popularity keeps growing, we have no shortage of volunteers, crew leaders and ambassadors. We are averaging between 100 – 200 volunteers per event.

A Day In The Park

Folks come from all around the Atlanta area, and beyond, just to walk around in the Park. Well, maybe to do other things as well! Like prepare for a hike along the Appalachian Trail, The Andes, Denali, Mount Kilimanjaro, Mount Rainier, Philmont, among others. Some are here to prepare for the Peachtree. And a lot are here, just because it's here. With their family and extended family.

There is a lot to see. No, there are no spectacular waterfalls. But there are vistas of the Atlanta skyline. There are the battlefields, earthworks and cannon batteries from the Civil War.

There are easy trails and tough trails. Come to the Park during the sweltering days of July and August, and walk the trail from the Visitor Center to the Burnt Hickory/Old Mountain Rd Parking lot and back - a mere 6 miles (But at 90 degrees plus on summer afternoon....- This can test your abilities.

Or walk the Environmental Trail or the 24-Gun Battery Trail - on these cool, shaded trails of the Park in the summer. There are several other such trails as well - come and find them!

There can be solitude - yes, you'll see hikers and walkers, but you are on your own. They'll say "Hi" and be on their way.

And you will see deer and turkeys. And hawks and falcons. In the spring and in the fall, if you are here on the right days, come and see the geese as they come into the gap between Little Kennesaw and Big Kennesaw, find the thermals and circle there as they rise several thousand feet and then continue on their way. Amazing!!!!

Yes, some of our trails are still a little rough around the edges, and stuff happens - trees fall, heavy rains put "dents" in our trails. But we - and you, our volunteers, are making progress. And it is getting better.

We have great relationships at the Park. We are indeed family. The Park Staff, us, the Trail Club (its crew leaders, trail ambassadors and board members), the Cannon Crews, and Living History folks, the gift shop staff. We are all a part of the team wanting to make this a great place to visit and be a part of.

Richard Angeli, Jerry Givan, I and the rest of our original group had a vision, and have seen the Trail Club grow and prosper, along with the park. We have enjoyed these first 14 years and look forward to the continuation of the effort.

Kennesaw Mountain Trail Club Goes International!

Eton House is an English immersion school for 3-5 year-olds. We gave our presentation to the assembly of students, around 80 kids.

Our topic was the importance of National Parks. Korea has



a fine National Park System.

We were struck by how much the silhouette of Namsan Mountain reminded us of Kennesaw Mountain.

Namsan Mountain was part of the outer defenses of Seoul in ancient times. It is 270 meters tall (877 ft.). Since Seoul is just above sea level, it is just about the same elevation above the surrounding terrain as Big K.

Now the city surrounds the mountain which is a popular park for hiking. Three highway tunnels have been cut through the base of Namsan. The North Seoul tower has been built on top for observation. There is a driving road to the top and a hiking road to the top plus many very well used hiking trails. Plus a cable car. Parking is a big issue.

Does all this sound familiar?!

Seoul is a city of 25 million. It is very vertical with many, many tall buildings.

Korea is 70% mountainous.


