Trail Closure on Kolb Farm East Trail at John Ward Creek

The bridge crossing John Ward Creek on the Kolb Farm East section of trail has become damaged and washed out with the recent heavy rain. Crew Leader Workday, October 17, 2020

The small workday planned for October 10 was rained out.

On October 17, 2020, eight multitalented crew leaders completed several projects on the 24 Gun Battery Trail. Rich cut out the dirt between the deck boards on the Gilbert Road bridge to allow rain water to seep through, blew a few leaves off with his handy little battery-operated blower, then joined the dirt crew. Bob, Bill, Mike Fred, and Glenn (back from California where he's been fighting fires with the Forrest Service), removed duff, log, and rock berms that have been holding water on the trail and cut many knicks through the duff deposited by soil and organic material loosened by hundreds of thousand feet over time. Harry and Scott removed two large blowdowns, and then hauled a couple loads of loose rocks to a site for a future project.

The only glitch was at the end of the day when somebody (whose name will not be mentioned here) forgot to drive Bob back out to Gilbert Road to get his truck.

The ELM System comes to KMNBP

The following information was provided by the Cobb County Neighborhood Safety Commission:

Last Wednesday, October 21st, the Cobb County Neighborhood Safety Commission hosted the "Family Fun and Outdoor Activity Safety" event. It included Cobb Police Department, Cobb Department of Public Safety, Cobb Emergency Management Agency and Cobb PARKS, as well as the National Park Service. National Park Service staff was gracious enough to allow the Safety Commission access to Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park to install the ELM System. Superintendent Patrick Gamman and Chief Ranger Anthony Winegar were



on hand. Gamman spoke to visitors about his tenure in the National Park Service and how he plans to tackle upcoming enhancements to the park. ELM stands for Emergency Location Marker.

Members of the West Georgia Mountain Bike Patrol/Search and Rescue team handed out fliers regarding the ELM program. You can learn more about the ELM system at this **YouTube** video, as well as a video by Chief Ranger Anthony Winegar - https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=T3oqekzQnac. The bike patrol provided a short description of the ELM program to more than 250 visitors on Wednesday. Essentially, If an emergency occurs, and you can provide 911 with the eight digit code from a nearby marker, like the one, above, they can quickly locate your position!

2020 Veterans Day

Who doesn't know that this has been a very tough year? (A rhetorical question that doesn't need an answer.) Now Veterans Day is upon us. Tough times were and are natural for many of our military veterans.

Back at the time of World War I, veterans were coming out of the service and then hit with the "Spanish Flu" pandemic, and now with the mid-east pull down of troops many are being discharged during the "Covid-19" pandemic. As Veterans Day resulted from the WWI armistice things haven't changed all that much. However, you can and should "Thank a Veteran" for defending the freedom of our country.

One dire issue that has been recently brought to light is the number of suicides experienced in the veteran community. Our Trail Club recently lost a valued member, Ken Hale, a US Air Force Veteran. Ken passed away from a disease, not suicide. But like many diseases it was not readily detectable. Losing someone in what we like to think of as "before their time" is never an easy thing to understand.

And the same goes for our loved ones who commit suicide. I was recently called upon to give the eulogy for an Honorably Discharged Marine. It was a "last minute" type call, I knew neither the man, nor the family, all I got from the funeral

director was that the family needed closure from a USMC veteran as the deceased had perished due to suicide. Yes, that is tragic and it's been publicized much lately for all to be aware of those who are depressed and need help. But as with a disease how do you know?

I went and gave the eulogy and I thanked the family for inviting me; I mainly thanked the deceased Marine, for his service to our country - be what it was, it didn't matter; that he stepped up and served was all that I needed to know.

On this Veterans Day keep in mind that there has not been a draft for a long, long time - those who serve volunteer to do so. If you're one of the ones who volunteer to help out at the park - good for you. But this old Vet would like you to reach out to your friends and family to find out how they're doing and if you do happen to recognize a veteran just nod your head in a greeting. They already know what they've done.



Plans For Kennesaw Mountain Guidebook Begun

All proceeds resulting from the sale of guidebooks will be distributed to the park directly for improvement projects and in support of ongoing programs and services.




Turkey Time

We arrived around 11 AM on a beautiful, cool day.

First thing we noticed was folks up on the VC roof and 2 repair trucks parked near the pavilion.

We took the VC cutoff trail to the Brumby Trail, around the CCC camp and Brumby Trail all the way to the Little K cut off trail and returned via Picket Line trail.

Most of the 55 visitors and 10 dogs on leash we saw were seen by the time we got to the CCC Camp.

At the CCC Camp we were surprised to see 3 houses under construction right on the Park boundary.

There was also a nice new wayside at the CCC Camp site.



Between the CCC camp and the Little K cut off trail every down hill is steep and very eroded down to rock. Lots of wildlife, a buck, 3 does, heard an owl and saw an impressive spider and web.

On the return leg we found a female visitor down from a fall. Her companion had already called 911. We stayed with her until fire, NPS LE and paramedics arrived. At the CCC camp Anne Page directed a fire gator with a stretcher to the injured person. They had used the new ELM signs to direct the paramedics to their location. See page 2, herein.

At the Mountain Road cross walk a small dog had slipped its leash. Fortunately, cars stopped until the owner regained control. The friendly dog immediately slipped the leash again and came over to us. So we made friends until the owner arrived.

Arriving at the VC we ran into Ranger Jake. He told us about a new app that works off the emergency numbers posted throughout the park: MyUSNG. Jake is to join Jay's presentation via Zoom to Cobb County Newcomers on 20 Oct. Jay will send Jake his slides.

We went to the VC for the first time to see how it is set up for Covid. Anne Page helped a family new to Kennesaw who

had no masks by getting them hiking maps and explaining their hiking options. Their question was "is there any place to hike around here?"

VC gardens in great shape including flowering asters, ageratum, Indian pinks and azaleas.

Leave No Trace ~ Awareness Workshop Saturday, November 21 at 10:00 am

Leave No Trace State Advocate and Master Educator Jay Dement will present a two hour workshop exploring the seven Leave No Trace principles. Participants will gain an increased understanding of the impacts visitors make and how to mitigate them. In addition there will be a review of the Authority of the Resource Technique for approaching people in the Park.

This session is open to everyone interested in being a better steward of the trails at Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park especially Trail Ambassadors. In addition to covering the principles participants will also learn about the education and research of the Leave No Trace Center for Outdoor Ethics.


