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Expect delays at Dallas Hwy and Whitlock Ave

Crews will start clearing work for the Whitlock Avenue trail segment of the Kennesaw Mountain Pedestrian Improvements on Monday, Oct. 25. Significant delays are expected along Dallas Highway/Whitlock Avenue between John Ward Road and Cheatham Hill Drive. Crews will be working in the area from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on weekdays, and road capacity will be reduced to one lane.

Traffic delays are expected to be worse in the afternoon in the westbound direction. Alternate routes are recommended.





Volunteer Hours

Each Fiscal Year we submit our hours worked to the National Park Service, documenting our service. This is made up of two components - hours that the volunteers who participate in our Work Days contributed, and the hours the Crew Leaders, Trail Ambassadors and Board Members contributed. The decrease in hours for 2017 - 2019 can be attributed to only one thing - we had several work days cancelled in each of those years for inclement weather. As for 2020 and 2021 - there is only one reason for the fewer hours - Covid 19. We are hoping 2022 is a better year. We have a number of projects that will be of interest to all of our visitors and volunteers- stay tuned! As for the value of the volunteer hours, each year the federal government analyzes the effort - this year a volunteer hour was valued at \$28.54.



2021/2022 Fund Raising

Your volunteer hours help greatly for the many projects we do in the park and we greatly appreciate you contributing your "sweat equity" alongside our 80+ staff volunteers who routinely support each event. We are a non-profit all volunteer organization. However, like any business, we do have bills to pay.

Many of our projects are funded by the park or through grants we apply for. These funds are typically targeted for specific projects and do cover the big expenses such as rocks, stone dust, dirt, wood beams, bridges, fences, and such. But, after all the big stuff is paid for, we still have need to cover our day-to-day operating expenses for things like saw blade sharpening, fuel, tool repairs, equipment maintenance, work gloves, bug spray, drinking water, snacks, and porta-potties, along with basic business expenses - e.g. insurance. For these expenses, we rely on your donations.

Each year we kick off a new round of fund raising and this is the 2021/2022 big "ask." We need your help with this, even small donations help. We will conclude this drive at the end of FY 2022 (September, 2022).

As we approach our 19th year in operation, we ask you to please think '20', like \$20... \$40... \$60..... \$200... \$2000. All donations to the Trail Club support our work at the park, and are tax deductible.



Upcoming Work Day Schedule:

We are back in the business of trail maintenance! See the sign-up links, above. We are still limiting our numbers, but anyone one is now welcome to sign-up.

The Trail Club will provide supervision and tools. Volunteers should wear work clothes and closed toed shoes. Participants are encouraged to bring their own water, work gloves and masks. The NPS Volunteer Service Agreement and COVID forms are required, signed by a parent or guardian, if the student is under 18 years old. The forms are available on the trail club web site: http://www.kennesawmountaintrailclub.org/volunteer.php

Parking and registration will be at the *Pigeon Hill Parking Lot* (at the corner of Old Mountain Rd and Burnt Hickory. Registration will open at 8:00 am. Vehicle Entrance Passes will issued at registration. Volunteer are to gather in the field adjacent to the Parking lot no later than 8:30 am.

If your school, church, business, or community organization would like to schedule a special work day as a team building or public service activity once we resume our work day schedules, e-mail us at trails@kennesawmountaintrailclub.org at least 4 weeks in advance. Trail work can be performed any day of the week.

We work closely with the Park Service and assist the park staff by providing critically needed volunteer effort to install signs, build bridges, and maintain the 20+ miles of trails. Since our beginning in 2002, the Trail Club has donated over 45,000 volunteer hours to Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park.



Kennesaw Mountain and the Swiss Alps

(In memoriam to USMC veteran, Jim Mathis,) by Susan Caolo

Thave experienced the Swiss Alps and Kennesaw Mountain many times, but until I met USMC veteran, James "Jim" Mathis, I never connected the two. Back in December 2017, I met Jim at the Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park Visitor Center while recruiting interviewees for the KMNBP Veterans History Project (VHP). A KMNBP staff member, who knew Jim, arranged

the introduction. Jim greeted me with a big warm smile and genuine interest as I explained details about the Veterans History Project. When I asked if he'd be willing to participate, he responded like so many veterans do, "Yes, but I don't have anything very interesting to share." We spent the next few minutes sitting and talking casually in a corner of the KMNBP Visitor center. I was impressed by his vitality and passion for hiking and mountaineering for which he credited to his time in the Corps. He said he lived nearby in Marietta, so hiking KMNBP was part of his daily routine when he wasn't in Switzerland guiding Alpine hikers. It was also at



club card for individuals who ascend to the highest point in each of the 50 states. I don't recall exactly how many

state summits he had not completed, but I think it was less than 10, maybe even 5! Either way, this initial conversation made quite an impression as to Jim's character and passion for the outdoors and mountaineering. I looked forward to learning more about his Marine Corps experiences and how they shaped his life after the service. We exchanged emails so that I could send the required paperwork and schedule a time for Jim's official VHP interview.

n December 13, 2017, Jim and I met for the interview in the conference room of the KMNBP administration building. Jim and I had spoken numerous times about the Veterans History Project prior to December 13th, so the interview flowed like a comfortable conversation.

im was born on January 19, 1939 in Washington D.C. and he began his Marine Corps basic training at Parris Island, 🕽 South Carolina on July 15, 1957. Jim joined the Marines shortly after graduating high school since he couldn't afford college and he didn't want to be drafted. Prior to high school, Jim thought he would join the Navy because of a Navy Chaplain he met on his newspaper route. The Chaplain took him to visit Anacostia Naval Air Station and bought him a sailor hat. But reading about Marines in <u>Battle Crv</u> by Leon Uris during his sophomore/junior year changed his mind.

Throughout the interview, Jim's attention to detail and his natural storytelling ability made for compelling recollections of "first time" Marine related experiences. The rigorous physical training, discipline, travel by train, plane, and ship and exposure to people and places he had never dreamed of seeing apparently became a way of life for Jim. As I listened to Jim talk about decades of guiding groups through the Swiss Alp villages in summer, I could visualize the beauty of my own summers in Switzerland many years ago. But I never connected Kennesaw Mountain to the Swiss Alps until I interviewed Jim for the Veterans History Project. I realized how important the people he met hiking at Kennesaw Mountain, the camaraderie, were to him.

the veterans I interviewed also share a close connection to Kennesaw Mountain so I thought it would be 🕰 appropriate to honor the memory of Jim Mathis by sharing his comments about the Marines and the friendships he made hiking Kennesaw Mountain. November 6 @ 11:00 am- Native American Program

November is Native American Heritage Month. This program, held at the Visitor Center, will trace the history of the indigenous peoples of Cobb County from their hunter- gatherer origins to today.

November 7 @ 11:00 am: Pigeon Hill Hike

On the morning of June 27th, 1864, the Union army would coordinate multi-faceted diversions and attacks against the Confederate 'Kennesaw Line'.

> One of the major frontal assaults was up the rocky slopes of Pigeon Hill. Join a ranger for this moderate .5- 1 mile hike along the battle line.

November 13 @ 11:00 am- 1 pm: Sherman/ Thomas HQ Rove

There will be a Ranger roving in the vicinity of the Sherman/Thomas HQ site, near Activity Area 3. Come on out, say hello, and talk to us about the battle! (GPS: 33.933020, -84.604780)

November 14 @ All Day: Infantry Demo and Camp Life

Come on out for the LAST infantry demonstration of the year! Our living historians will set up a Union Camp in the field in front of the Visitor Center to showcase what life was like for the average Civil War soldier in the field. Rifle firings will occur at 10 am, 11 am, 1 pm and 2 pm.

November 20 @ 11:00 am- 1 pm: Illinois Monument Rove

There will be a Ranger roving in the vicinity of the Illinois Monument at Cheatham Hill. Come on out, say hello, and talk to us about the battle! (GPS: 33.936937, -84.596903)

November 21 @ 11:00 am Environmental Trail Hike

This 1.33 mile hike will take you along the foot of Big Kennesaw Mountain, where you will discover the flora and fauna of north Georgia as well as Native American and Civil War history. We'll meet at the picnic area near the Visitor Center.

November 24 @ 10:30 am & 12:30 pm: Abraham Lincoln's Thanksgiving Celebrations of thankfulness for the harvest have existed since pre-history. Did you know that the story

of this great American holiday has origins planted in the Civil War and with Abraham Lincoln? Come out and greet special guest Larry Elliot at the Visitor Center as he portrays the 16th president and the fascinating story of Lincoln and Thanksgiving!

November 27 @ 11:00 am: Importance of Battlefields

Join Ranger Amanda as she discusses the importance of preserving historic battlefields, and the preservation efforts taken by the National Park Service. This 30-minute ranger led program will be held on the Visitor Center's front patio.


Lincoln's Thanksgiving

John Ward Creek Crossing Closed to Horseback Riders

Kennesaw, GA – Effective immediately, the John Ward Creek crossing just south of the Illinois Monument is closed to horseback riders until further notice. This closure stems from a safety concern due to hazardous conditions relating to an unstable streambed. The closure affects the creek crossing between Milepost 3.5 and Milepost 4 of the Kolb's Farm East Trail.

Superintendent Patrick Gamman states, "We are concerned for the safety of all park users. Crossing John Ward Creek at this section of the trail poses a risk that we want to alert our horse community to, as it could potentially cause harm to both horse and rider. We will be working as quickly as possible to mitigate this problem."
