What Does It Take to Maintain Our Trails? - Crew Leader Training Class - 10/22/22

The Kennesaw Mountain Trail Club, on behalf of Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park, will be conducting *Trail Maintenance Training* on Saturday, October 22, 2022, from 8:00 am to 12:30 pm. This class is for anyone who wants to understand the basics of trail maintenance. If you have ever wondered how this maintenance gets done; this is for you. Note the class alone does not allow you to do maintenance, however you will leave with an understanding of what it takes to keep the trails in a condition that park visitors will enjoy. This class is required for those that want to become Maintenance Crew Leaders, along with three On-the-Job Trainings that will be performed as part on the Trail Club's second Saturday of every month Workday.

We will start promptly at 8:00 at the tool shed. From there we will go down to the training room at the Visitor Center for a couple of hours of classroom training and some hot coffee and donuts. After the training session, we will hike up Kennesaw stopping at various points to discuss what we learned in the classroom.

For those that do not know where the tool shed is: Follow the road going up the mountain. Take the first right that says staff and volunteers. You will be parking in the field across from the Superintendent's Office, located on the right before you get to the fence, weather permitting. Those attending will be issued temporary volunteer passes that will be issued when you arrive. The paid \$5 per day or annual pass will not work here.

After parking, go through the fence. The tool shed is the first door on the left.

2022/2023 Fund Raising

Your volunteer hours help greatly for the many projects we do in the park and we greatly appreciate you contributing your "sweat equity" alongside our 80+ staff volunteers who routinely support each event. We are a non-profit all volunteer organization. However, like any business, we do have bills to pay.

Many of our projects are funded by the park or through grants we apply for. These funds are typically targeted for specific projects and do cover the big expenses such as rocks, stone dust, dirt, wood beams, bridges, fences, and such. But, after all the big stuff is paid for, we still have need to cover our day-to-day operating expenses for things like saw blade sharpening, fuel, tool repairs, equipment maintenance, work gloves, bug spray, drinking water, snacks, and porta-potties, along with basic business expenses - e.g. insurance. 

The Trail Club will provide supervision and tools. Volunteers should wear work clothes (such as long-sleeve shirts and long pants) and closed toed shoes. Participants are encouraged to bring their own water, work gloves and masks. The NPS Volunteer Service Agreement and COVID forms are required, signed by a parent or guardian, if the student is under 18 years old. Park Improvement Coming In April, 2023!

A restroom facility has been approved and construction will begin in the April, 2023 time frame near the Illinois Monument Parking Lot on Cheatham Hill Drive. The funds collected through the parking fees have made this improvement possible!

Expect delays at Dallas Hwy and Whitlock Ave

Some work continues on the trail segment along Whitlock Ave, and some delays can still be expected. Significant delays are expected along Dallas Highway/Whitlock Avenue between John Ward Road and Cheatham Hill Drive. Crews will be working in the area from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on weekdays, and road capacity will be reduced to one lane.

Traffic delays are expected to be worse in the afternoon in the westbound direction. Alternate routes are recommended.

Lead By Quiet Example

A text came to me which read that my friend the Queen died. Yes, I'd already heard the sad news of Queen Elizabeth II passing. The text was just a short message and I wondered why he used, "My friend." Maybe I'd told him about visiting London, but surely never mentioned seeing the Queen. Hey, I remembered that I could actually use the phone

and call my buddy instead of what I normally do - text. So I called and said, "Hey, what's this about the Queen being my friend." He said don't you remember while being in the hospital for almost a week, every day there was a car parked on the lot that could be seen from your window and it had a photo cut out of the Queen that made it look like Her Majesty was sitting on the back seat. Thanks for reminding me, I said, and

recalled thinking that people got a bigger kick out of seeing the picture in the car than me. Kind of a silent reminder that people appreciated her. During news coverage one of the people commenting on the Queen's passing did say that she led by quiet example. A photo cut out on a car window, that is quiet. But sometimes that's all it takes to get a response.

I'm more like the English band "*Pink Flyod*" singing on their album "*The Walf*"., "*hello can you hear me - is there anybody out there.*" Sometimes all that's heard is silence. Like the procession of a funeral walk, in silence.

When President Bush during a Bicentennial celebration mistakenly said that the Queen was here for the 1776 event (oops) quickly corrected to the 1976 date, he said that the Queen gave him a look that only a mother could. We've all most likely had a time like that, nothing was said and for

sure better not say anything back. A quiet example.

If you've experienced the "Field of Flags" set up at Kennesaw Mountain in remembrance of lives lost in the 9/11 attack, it's a quiet display. One can walk among the flags and just listen to the ruffled fluttering. A quiet example.

And at the conclusion of the 150th commemoration of the

Battle at Kennesaw Mountain the field below the Dead Angle at the Illinois Monument was covered with luminary bags as a silent reminder of those who perished in battle. A quiet example.

Pretty soon its fall and activity on the trails will settle down, fewer people means not as noisy. Those early mornings or mid afternoon hikes offer a lot of quiet time. If you work a Trail Day, the walk out to a work site is usually quiet and the Crew Leaders can communicate using a softer

tone as the underbrush doesn't muffle their talking. That may be considered a quiet example.

Leading by quiet example simply means that others are watching. Using tools properly and performing the work in an orderly manner is observed by others. Dressing for and presenting appropriate appearance helps get a message across to visitors and those needing assistance. Common courtesy seems to work very well, just take it easy and don't show stress. That's something that can be performed quietly. Now think about doing that for 70 years 214 days.

Enjoy some quiet time for reflection while out on the trail, you're doing good to be out there. It's not necessary to shout and carry on about something; be quiet and carry on; people will notice.

An Abbreviated History Of KMTC

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the Kennesaw Mountain Trail Club, or more commonly known as the KMTC. Over the next few months, a brief history of the Trail Club will be provided here. I hope that you enjoy going back with us to remember these events.

Our Historian, emeritus, Jay Haney provided the first article in this regard.

2002

Spring, 2002. Two Boy Scout leaders, Richard Angeli and Fred Feltmann, used the trail from Little Kennesaw Mountain the Visitor Center and back to train for a backpacking trip. The trail was in such bad shape that they decided to volunteer to spend some time fixing that trail. From this idea the trail club was born.

Condition of Little Kennesaw Mountain trail in 2002 - poor - a number of visitors were suffering injuries while hiking this trail.

Summer Richard Angeli, who was also a member of the Georgia Appalachian Trail Club (GATC), spent the summer working with NPS Maintenance Supervisor Marion Harris and other mentors from GATC planning and organizing the volunteer trail workers.

August and September Public organizational meetings were held at the park visitor center that resulted in the formation of "KEMOTrail Corps, Inc". The participants in that second meeting thought they were being clever in choosing the name: "KEMO" for the NPS designation for the park, "Trail" because trails were to be the focus of activity, and "Corps" to capture the military history aspect of the park. The only problem was most people thought "KEMOTrail" had something to do with "chemotherapy". It took a couple of years to figure that out and start using the more generic designation "Kennesaw Mountain Trail Club"

October 19th. The first organized trail club activity was a trash pick-up day when 25 volunteers picked up 40 bags of trash.

November 9th. The first trail work day was held. More than 60 people of all ages turned out to work on the trail at the top of Kennesaw Mountain.

John Ward Creek Crossing Closed to Horseback Riders

Kennesaw, GA – Effective immediately, the John Ward Creek crossing just south of the Illinois Monument is closed to horseback riders until further notice. This closure stems from a safety concern due to hazardous conditions relating to an unstable streambed. The closure affects the creek crossing between Milepost 3.5 and Milepost 4 of the Kolb's Farm East Trail.

Superintendent Patrick Gamman states, "We are concerned for the safety of all park users. Crossing John Ward Creek at this section of the trail poses a risk that we want to alert our horse community to, as it could potentially cause harm to both horse and rider. We will be working as quickly as possible to mitigate this problem."

Leave No Trace Sustainer Course

On Saturday November 5, 2022 the Sustainer Course will be offered to all Trail Ambassadors and club members. It will be held in the Visitor Center at Kennesaw Mountain NBP from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm. This program covers the seven principles of Leave No Trace as they apply at KEMO. It is intended for Trail Ambassadors as well as anyone interested in becoming more familiar with the principles.



The seven Leave No Trace Principles of Outdoor Ethics provide a decision framework on how to lessen one's impact on the fragile environment. With this understanding we can make better decisions on how we recreate in the woods, and help others.

The class is taught by long time club member, Trail Ambassador and Leave No Trace Master Educator Jay Dement. Master Educator CJ Bradbury a Trail Ambassador with the Georgia Appalachian Trail Club will be the co-leader. Participants will receive a patch for the uniform and a certificate of completion.




