#### **Great American Outdoors Act Passed** The Great American Outdoors Act has passed both houses of Congress and has been signed into law. The Act charges fees for on-shore and off-shore energy development to provide funding for protection of Federal lands in several organizations including the National Park Service. The funds will be used to provide matching funds for government

purchase of land and provide funds for working down the huge backlog of deferred maintenance. Hopefully this Act will benefit Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park.

## **24-Gun Battery Trail Bridge Repairs** By **Bill Gury**

In 2014 The KEMO trail club built the new 1½-mile 24-Gun Battery trail from the Environmental Trail out to the remote, well-preserved 24-Gun battery site to be ready for the 150th anniversary of the Battle of Kennesaw Mountain. As part of the construction, Boy Scouts and the Trail Club built 5 foot bridges to cross small streams and ditches. The events out at the site were very successful. The bridges have helped make the 24-Gun Battery trail a popular one.

Although the bridges were well built, four of them were lower than the trails leading to the bridges. Water, dirt, duff, and leaves flowed down the trail and collected on the bridge decks and were causing the bridge decks to rot in places. The side rails tended to hold the water and muck on the bridges. Also, when the bridges were too muddy and flooded, hikers and runners sometimes tip-toed across on the slippery side rails. Attempts to divert the water off the trail and remove the rock berms bridges originally placed at the bridge approaches proved unsuccessful.

On August 26 and August 28, Crew Leaders met and repaired the bridges. First, Bruce and Andy with help from Bill and Bob lifted the bridges and added blocks under the bridge beams at the abutments to raise four of the bridges 3.6." Now, all the bridges are above the trail approaches, and water and duff from the trail won't be able to settle on the bridges (except for rain and leaves that will fall directly on the bridges).

Second, Donald, Bill, Jerry, Fred and Andy placed gravel mixed with dirt at the approaches to make a smooth transition onto the bridges, especially for the Gator.

Finally, skilled carpenters Eric, Coach Rich, and Geoff rebuilt the side rails by slicing the existing lower rails into "blocks" and laid another new side rail on top so that we still have a continuous rail all the way across. Now, under the new rail, there are openings all the way along the sides for water to run off. This crew also replaced about 6 or 8 rotted deck boards.

Next, we need to watch how hikers cross and how water flows off the sides of the trail rather than on the bridge. Then we need to return to groom the trails to make any corrections.



We greet and assist visitors, answer questions, give advice on trails to hike (which includes helping the lost find their way back to their cars!), politely remind visitors of the rules and regulations, and report adverse trail conditions.

At this time, it is not known when Trail Ambassadors will have more volunteer opportunities such as providing registration on second Saturday trail work days, assisting with Ranger led hikes, supporting interpretive events such as school field trips, artillery and infantry demonstrations.



## The Continuing Saga Of The American Chestnut

On an August 2020 TA foot patrol along the Hardage Mill Trail, Anne Page Mosby and Jay Haney identified an American Chestnut tree using an ap on their cell phone. During the Civil War, the American Chestnut tree was logged and cut into boards at the Hardage Mill located on Noses Creek.

The American chestnut tree reigned over 200 million acres of eastern woodlands from Maine to Florida, and from the Piedmont plateau in the Carolinas west to the Ohio Valley, until succumbing to a lethal fungus infestation, known as the chestnut blight, during the first half of the 20th century. An estimated 4 billion American chestnuts, up to 1/4 of the hardwood tree population, grew within this range.

## Profit... and Loss

Before the Civil War, this quiet creek was a busy place. George and John Hardage, who lived nearby, started of sawmill here in 1853. Their mill turned American chestnuts, pittes, hickory, and oak trees into thousands of board feet of lumber.

Like other sawmills in north Georgia, the Hardsge sawmill was a cornerstone of the local economy. Some landowners sold logi as a cash crop. Others worked cutting and hauling trees Most people needed planking for houses, barns, fences, and furniture.


By mid-June of 1864, both Confederate and Union soldiers were entrenched and firing at each other from the woods just north of the savemill. The Hardages and their neighbors had to flee for their lives. Some pever returned.



**Native range of the American chestnut tree (castanea dentata).** Note: If you look closely at this map, you will note that there was a cluster of American Chestnuts in and around Cobb County - specifically in the area of Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park! As an aside, there is a surviving grove of trees in FDR State Park, near Pine Mountain, GA - the map also shows this cluster as well. These trees are still susceptible to the blight, however. I last saw them about 4 years ago and they were still doing well then. Some of the trees were blight-free.

The range also extended into Canada as well.

## Visitor Center and Mountain Rd Now Open

The Visitor Center opened, effective Friday, August 28, 2020. The park film will not be showing as they are unable to properly prepare the space for social distancing. Otherwise, the rest of the Visitor Center will be open.

There will be a limited number of visitors allowed in the Visitor Center, so you may see an Interpretation Ranger counting visitors entering and leaving the building. Visitors will be guided to enter the building through the patio doors and will exit through the doors leading to the restroom area. There will be an information table located at the entrance to provide brochures, maps, and general park information to help limit the number of visitors looking for the basic information during their visit.

The Mountain Road is now open, effective Monday, August 31, 2020. This service will be offered Monday - Friday 8:00 am - 7:00 pm. The road will be closed to vehicular traffic, including bicycles, on weekends and there will be no shuttle service offered at this time, due to inability to social distance on the shuttle bus.

The park has reenacted their fees program. If you don't have a Park Pass, you will need to purchase your Park Pass online (<u>https://www.recreation.gov/sitepass/2788</u>) or at the Visitor Center.

#### In summary:

Beginning August 28, 2020, Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park will reopen access to:

- The park's Visitor Center (including the museum),
- America's National Parks bookstore/gift shop, and
- Park pass purchases in the Visitor Center.

Beginning August 31, 2020 Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park will reopen vehicular access to (on weekdays, only):

- Mountain road and
- Mountain road parking lot.

With public health in mind, the following services remain inaccessible:

- Shuttle bus operation
- Theater inside the Visitor Center

Park patrons entering the Visitor Center will be encouraged to exercise social distancing, follow the designated traffic flow and wear masks in addition to following other Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines.

## Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park to increase access to park grounds and facilities

**Kennesaw, GA** – Following guidance from the White House, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and state and local public health authorities, Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park is increasing access and services. The National Park Service (NPS) is working servicewide with federal, state, and local public health authorities to closely monitor the COVID-19 pandemic and using a phased approach to increase access on a park-by-park basis.

Beginning August 28, 2020, Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park will reopen access to:

- The park's Visitor Center (including the museum),
- America's National Parks bookstore/gift shop, and
- Park pass purchases in the Visitor Center.

Beginning August 31, 2020 Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park will reopen access to:

- Mountain road and
- Mountain road parking lot.

With public health in mind, the following service remains inaccessible:

- Shuttle bus operation
- Theater inside the Visitor Center

Park patrons entering the Visitor Center will be encouraged to exercise social distancing, follow the designated traffic flow and wear masks in addition to following other Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines.

The mountain road gate will open at 8:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m. Monday – Friday to allow for vehicular traffic, which includes bicycles. No shuttle service will be in operation at this time due to social distancing concerns.

The health and safety of our visitors, employees, volunteers, and partners continues to be paramount. At Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park, our operational approach continues to be centered on examining each facility function and service to ensure those operations comply with current public health guidance and are regularly monitored. We continue

to work closely with the NPS Office of Public Health using CDC guidance to ensure public areas and workspaces are safe and clean.
