July 8 Trail Day?

OK I'll give thanks to our website editor; Fred, he said it best. "This is one of those times". As stated written on first page of our website, we may cancel Trail Day if there is heavy rain the night before; well there was. Yes the morning was clear and dry, but the trail was too wet for efficient work.

Our work plan was to use equipment to aid in moving material to correct severe ruts in the trail. Teams would assist in positioning material to fill in gullies and direct water away from the trail.

We have found that using equipment on a wet trail actually causes more problems than correcting them. Also, areas which we were going to be working could be a safety concern with wet ground. In all cases we believe the safety of volunteers is our primary concern.

Thus Trail Day was canceled some 12 hours before start time. One thing that we appreciate is that nearly everyone

Student Conservation Association (SCA) Working with KMTC

Again, for our 3rd year now, Kennesaw Mountain and KMTC are hosting an SCA Team.

This year we have two Team Leaders and a trainee Team Leader along with 4 female and 4 male teens from all across the country - Alaska to Florida (and even one from Smyrna). They are all great young adventurers, gotta be because they do primitive camping. However, unlike in years past, all but one live in large metropolitan areas. That being said, they all still have the desire to work hard on any assigned project.

This year we incorporated many more KMTC Crew Leaders to help with guidance on the projects. SCA does well in getting qualified Team Leaders and the organization has as its goal to perform trail work and do projects which help in the conservation of public lands. This year's team leaders quickly picked up on what we had planned for them.

Trail work has been performed on Big Kennesaw Mtn, the saddle area between the mountains, along Hardage Mill Trail, the Assault Trail and the Kolb Farm Trails. (Their work on the Kolb Farm trails included leveling and then creating water diversions on a highly rutted section - this was a much-needed project.) They also spent four days cutting invasive plants. And all this work performed during this years hottest days with off and on rain showers and storms. They are truly a group that has earned our respect and appreciation.

SCA has also had some good times: they decorated the 4 seat Gator and participated in the Marietta Independence Day parade, had breakfast at Whistle Stop, house party and fireworks on the 4th, went swimming @ private pool, an interpretive tour of the Assault Trail and CCC work at the

August 12, 2017 Work Day Plan

Site	Goals
n/a	Invasive Plants Control – small team will be needed.
1	Noses Creek Trail – Refresh water diversions up hill from field to its crest. Recrown trail.
2	Noses Creek Trail – Build water diversions down hill and just past Hardage Mill trail. Add water bar at top of Hardage Mill Trail to divert water from going down trail
3	Old New Salem Church Trail – Refresh water diversions going up to crest of hill. Find and bury large rocks to occasionally crib down hill side of trail. Remove any small stumps in trail.
4	Old New Salem Church Trail – Build water diversions from crest of hill down to field.
5	Old New Salem Church Trail – Build water diversions from church site down to flat before the stairs.
6	Brumby Camp Trail – Dig out drainage ditch up to crest of hill.
7	Perform 12' tall and 1' side pruning along route noted on map. Go farther out Noses Creek trail if time permits. Remove any small stumps/rocks/dead roots from trail. Set any loose rocks into ground to crib trail's lower side.

Our trail work days are open to the public on the 2nd Saturday of each month and are a wonderful way to get outside & enjoy nature while helping preserve the national park for future visitors. Registration will begin around 8:10 am the Burnt Hickory/Old Mountain Rd. Parking lot. The program will begin at 8:30 am and we usually are finished by 1:00 p.m. Activities usually include the use of shovels, rakes, picks, and other tools to fix erosion problems on the 20+ mile trail system. Please do not wear open-toed shoes. Long pants are recommended. In case of inclement weather and we must cancel a workday, we'll post an announcement on the front page of the KMTC website at: www.kennesawmountaintrailclub.org



Everyday @ 1:00 pm Ranger-Led Museum Tour

Join a Kennesaw Mountain Park Ranger for an in-depth exploration of our museum chronicling the events surrounding the Battle of Kennesaw Mountain.

August

August 5 @ 11:00 pm 'Life of a Civil War Soldier'

Come out and enjoy an interactive demonstration on the daily life of a soldier during the Atlanta Campaign. This program will be held in the visitor center.

August 6 @ 3:00 pm 'Jr. Ranger Bingo'

Learn about the various elements of your National Park, such as the natural and cultural resources, through a fun and interactive game of Bingo! This program will meet at the Visitor Center.

August 12 & 27 @ 11:00 & 1:00 'Cheatham Hill History Talks'

Historians Phillip Whiteman and Stuart Berkowitz are leading a number of guided walks and history talks on the historic battle at Cheatham Hill. The programs last approximately an hour and consist of a short, 250 yard paved and dirt path. Please meet the historians at the Cheatham Hill Dr. parking area near the Illinois Monument.

August 13 @ 11,12, 2 & 3:00 'Artillery Demonstrations'

Artillerists explain the steps of firing a cannon by detailing the role of each person working the cannon. Afterwards, the process is performed in real time and the cannon is fired. The program is free and open to the public. Please note that cannon firings are very loud, especially to those with hearing sensitivity (i.e. dogs, children, etc.)

August 19 @ 11:00 am 'Pioneer Games'

Before there were computers and tablets, the children of the 19th century had to be more creative in how they spent their free time. Join us and participate in some of these games, which include hoop and stick, graces, and the ever famous cup and ball toy!

Come out and enjoy an interactive infantry demonstration at Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park. This program will consist of a step-by-step description and demonstration of basic infantry tactics and culminate in a musket firing. This program is free to attend and open to the public.

This 30 minute Ranger-led program focuses on the 1864 Atlanta Campaign and how the Union and Confederate forces moved through the north Georgia countryside to the city of Atlanta. This program will also utilize the various interpretive maps and signs of the Visitor Center.


