Upcoming Work Day Schedule:

Our trail work days are open to the public on the 2nd Saturday of each month and are a wonderful way to get outside & enjoy nature while helping preserve the national park for future visitors. Location will be at the Kolb's Farm parking area. Registration will begin around 8:10 am. The program will begin at 8:30 am and we usually are finished by 1:00 p.m. Activities usually include the use of shovels, rakes, picks, and other tools to fix erosion problems on the 20+ mile trail system. Please do not wear open-toed shoes. Long pants are recommended. In case of inclement weather and we must cancel a workday, we'll post an announcement on the front page of the KMTC website at: www.kennesawmountaintrailclub.org

If your school, church, business, or community organization would like to schedule a special work day as a team building or public service activity, e-mail us at kmtctrails@ kennesawmountaintrailclub.org at least 4 weeks in advance. Trail work can be performed any day of the week.

We work closely with the Park Service and assist the park staff by providing critically needed volunteer effort to install signs, build bridges, and maintain the 20+ miles of trails. Since our beginning in 2002, the Trail Club has donated over 45,000 volunteer hours to Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park.

Calling all Crew Leaders Trail Skills Workshop

November 4, 2017

Bruce Rugg and Ken Hale, our current and future KMTC Trails Directors, invite all Crew Leaders to join Jay Dement on Saturday, November 4, for a trail maintaining refresher workshop on the back side of Little "K." During this session we will explore more efficient methods of getting water off the trail and see some recent work by the SCA Kids as we go up Pigeon Hill.

Our work will concentrate on restoring the tread on Section 212. This trail has eroded and people have created a reroute below the original trail. We will build a rock crib wall to support the crush and dirt that will raise the tread, all from materials in the area. Finally, we will trash the old trail. We'll start at Whistle Stop for breakfast, of course, at 8:00, then make our way over to the Burnt Hickory parking lot, pick up tools, have the safety talk and make our way up the mountain. We will be conducting Crew leader training on Saturday, November 18th. The class starts promptly at 9 am and goes til 3 pm. This class is for people over 18 years of age, in good physical health, and can commit to support at least 11 of our 14 annual volunteer Saturdays. The class is also open to existing crew leaders who want to reinforce their learning.

The class focuses on the leadership skills and responsibilities for being the person in charge of a work team and leading them to complete trail work in a safe manner with the highest quality while also following the rules of Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park.

Graduates of the class will also gain Volunteer-in-park status, become voting members of the trail club, and be eligible for participating in other volunteer activities of their choice on other weekends and weekdays (additional training might be required for some activities).



Scouting Projects - End of Fiscal Year Report

We ended fiscal 2017 with 17 completed Eagle Scout projects using 334 volunteers and administering 2512 hours.

Of course, this does not report the scouts and/or troops who volunteered on workdays, etc., nor my hours.

Since the beginning of fiscal year 2012, there have been 109 Eagle Scout and one Girl Scout Silver projects, administering 2089 volunteers, and logging 16,709 hours. This doesn't count my hours either, of course.

This program is unequaled in all of Scouting and probably the NPS. . . at least as far as we know, so that is what we tell people(!)

This year, we placed nine more battlefield signs, refurbished several sets of earthworks, built and placed several benches, did trail enhancements on the main mountain trail as well as finished the fencing in the visitor center area.

We will need some replacement leadership in 2018 for the scout projects, but at this time, we are planning on scheduling projects on workdays, so I can administer with both at the same time.

Kennesaw Mountain Trail Club Trail Day Work Report Aug 2016 thru Sept 2017

Aug 2016 – Work was performed on the Kennesaw Mountain Trail from the summit (1808 ft elev) down to the paved intersection of the Little Kennesaw Trail (1600 ft elev). Four pallets of rocks (16,000 #) were moved hand to hand up the trail by lines of volunteers, forming piles in areas of future work positions.

Sept 2016 – No trail work due to the Field of Flags event. Crew leader and volunteers assisted in the install and removal of approx. 3000 flags.

Oct 2016 – Repairs on Big Kennesaw Mtn started...cribwalls, ramps, old fence rails removed. Moved large trailer of dirt uphill with buckets by volunteers. Drainages rebuilt and walls reinforced.

Nov 2016 - Moved second large trailer full of dirt up trail. Repairs and improvements continued.

Dec 2016 – Cancelled due to extremely cold weather.

Jan 2017 – Dirt in buckets brought by gators from CCC area to top of mountain. Rocks and dirt hand delivered by volunteers to work sites. Backpack blower used prior to each work day to remove extremely heavy leaf fall caused by drought to provide a safe clean trail. Roots and rocks were removed and soil used to buildup and smooth trail treadway.

Feb 2017 – Maintenance on Cease Fire Trail from Dallas Hwy past the Illinois Monument. Types of Work: pruning for horse safety, channeling and ditch cleanup along trail, deberming and water diversions.

Mar 2017 – Mountain Trail on Big K from summit parking lot down to the 'Grand Staircase'. Trail blocking of social and short cutting trails, rock stair work, drain cleanouts, pruning and water diversions.

Apr 2017 – Brumby Trail area from CCC to paved road. Many drain and channel cleanouts, pruning, and general trail repair, grooming.

May 2017 – From parking lot at Cheatham Hill Road; crews were sent in all directions along the East and West Kolb Farm Trails and Assault Trail, picnic and parking lot cleanup, rail fence cleanup along the road.

Jun 2017 – Volunteers fanned out from Burnt Hickory Road parking lot. Stair replacement at Burnt Hickory crosswalk of Brumby and New Salem Church trails. Heavy vegetation cleared along road to create a safer line of sight for hikers and vehicles, trail repairs, invasive work, and tree removals to reopen Little K Cutoff after several major blowdowns completely blocked the trail.

July & Aug 2017 - Trail Days cancelled due to bad weather.

Sept 2017 – (Sep 9) Work zones centered around the Kolb Farm area near the horse parking lot. Access trail improvement, finishing the rutted horse trail area with drainages, and ditch cleanouts and heavy pruning for horse and hiker safety.

- (Sep 30) Work zones centered around the Burnt Hickory and Old Mountain Rd parking lot. Cleared overhanging branches to allow safer horseback riding. Worked on the Old Salem Church trail to improve drainage. Cleared sections of privet.

Everyday @ 1:00 pm Ranger-Led Museum Tour

This 30 minute Ranger-led program discusses the differences between Civil War artillery pieces and how these differences changed warfare during the American Civil War.
